#### Ravioli Lasagna Recipe

Prep Time: 25 min

Bake Time: 40 min

Yield: 8 servings

#### **Ingredients**

- 1 pound ground beef
- 1 jar (28oz) spaghetti sauce
- 1 pkg (25oz) frozen sausage or cheese ravioli
- 1 1/2 cups shredded part-skim mozzarella cheese

Minced fresh basil (optional)

#### Directions

- In large skillet, cook beef over medium heat until no longer pink; drain. In greased 2 1/2qt baking dish, layer a third of the spaghetti sauce, half the ravioli and beef and 1/2 cup cheese. Repeat layers. Top with remaining sauce and cheese.
- 2. Cover and bake at 400 degrees until heated through, 40-45 minutes. If desired, top with basil to serve.

This recipe can be altered by adding some onion and garlic to the hamburger when you cook it. And/or use Italian sausage and some Italian seasoning. Want a little more moisture? Add a can of crushed tomatoes. Freeze the leftovers for a handy microwayable meal for later.

#### 1st Century Christian Fathers and Apologist's

#### **Ignatius of Antioch**

Ignatius of Antioch was an early church father, and not much is known about him. What we do know is primarily drawn from his own writings. Ignatius was the bishop of the church in <u>Antioch</u>, Syria, and was martyred under Emperor Trajan around AD 110. He was apparently a disciple of John, the beloved apostle, along with Polycarp, the bishop of Smyrna. Polycarp, Irenaeus, and Origen all refer to him or his epistles in their writings, confirming what we know of his life.

After presenting himself to Emperor Trajan and declaring his allegiance to Christ, Ignatius of Antioch was condemned to die in Rome. On his journey from Antioch to Rome, he was allowed to stop and visit Christians, and he wrote seven <u>letters</u> which have survived to this day. In these letters, he warned the churches about heresies that threatened their peace and unity and addressed points of ecclesiastical order that give us a glimpse of how the early church functioned.

The heresies that Ignatius of Antioch addressed were primarily <u>Gnosticism</u> and <u>Docetism</u>. The basis of these heresies was the pagan belief in <u>dualism</u>: spirit is good, flesh is evil. They recognized an eternal conflict between good and evil, mind and matter, idea and object. According to the Gnostics, Satan is the co-eternal opposite of the good God. With this view of the spirit world, people would be likely to say that God is limited in power and perhaps in knowledge and is doing the best he can with a sinful world. This heresy separated the divine Christ from the human Jesus and taught that the divine Christ came upon the human Jesus at His baptism and departed just before His death. According to Doceticism, since God is spirit, and spirit is good, but flesh is evil, then, if Jesus is God, He could not have taken on sinful flesh. The Jesus that lived among men and died on the cross was simply a phantom with an appearance like flesh. Ignatius argued that if Jesus did not truly take on human flesh and die as a man, then He could not have made atonement for our sins (<u>Hebrews 2:9, 9:12, 10:12</u>). His letters stressed the importance of communion as a means of stressing the reality of Jesus' humanity. He believed that, if Jesus did not truly shed His blood, then His martyrdom was meaningless.

Ignatius of Antioch's letters addressed the organization and authority of the local church. It is in his letters that we first find a clear distinction between bishops and elders. In the New Testament, the terms *pastor*, *elder*, and *bishop* are used interchangeably and clearly point to different aspects of one position. *Pastor* refers to the duties of feeding and tending to the flock of God as a shepherd. *Elder* refers to the position of honor and respect as the head of a family. *Bishop* refers to the duty of exercising oversight of others. The first churches appointed multiple elders who fulfilled all of these duties (Acts 14:23; 1 Peter 5:1–2). It is in Ignatius's writings that we first find the terms *bishop* and *presbyter* set in opposition to each other. By the time of Ignatius, churches had come to the practical conclusion that there had to be one "senior" pastor, who was called the bishop, and the other elders, or presbyters, were ranked under him in authority and position. Ignatius's letters acknowledged that the bishop was not necessarily the oldest among the elders, but was one whom God called to that position. Ignatius argued that there should be one bishop in charge of each congregation in order to prevent splits and ensure correct beliefs were preserved.

Men like Ignatius of Antioch followed in the footsteps of the apostles and formed the second generation of church leaders. The heresies and problems they addressed in their ministries still face us today, and we can learn much from their writings.

# Faith Lutheran Church Council Meeting - Minutes October 20, 2020

Meeting was called to order by Kathy Smith. Pastor Ian led in devotion.

Minutes from September 15 and 22 Council meetings were approved.

Financial Report – Sheryl Christensen presented monthly and YTD information. Total giving is slipping \$500 - \$1,000 each month.

Pastor's Report - Confirmation Service may be moved to Pentecost Sunday due to COVID restrictions. Pastor has been updating Faith Lutheran's website. Online giving works well and is secure.

Financial and Pastor's Reports were approved by Council.

#### **Committee Reports**

**Personnel** – Ann Krueger presented.

Offering/Money Handling Procedure was updated and approved by Council. Additional counters are needed to substitute, as needed.

<u>FLC Rental Policy and Room Reservation Sheet</u> was reviewed. Both members and non-members will be charged, since there are janitorial expenses etc. Non-profit organizations, such as the Boy Scouts, offer their services in return for using a meeting room. Policy was approved by Council.

Performance reviews for church staff will be completed by end of year.

**Property** – Ron Schleif reported property damage due to hail revealed parsonage roof needs replacing; also damage was done on the stucco on the elevator side of the church. Both items are included in insurance claim. A handyman has completed several repair items at both church and parsonage. The Committee will ensure shoveling and snow plowing are set up.

Ron noted the office has a list of who has keys to the church. Pastor and Kathy will follow up.

**Finance** – Sheryl Christensen noted the Committee has not been meeting; however, they are discussing any issues they see. Budget planning should be starting for 2021. Zoom accounts are available, should the committee want to utilize for meetings. Sheryl Christensen will schedule a meeting.

**Christian Education** – Denise Roetzer reported Sunday School and Wednesday night Kingdom Kids are meeting online. Bags of materials have been delivered to enrolled students to go along with the classes.

**Social Ministry** – Kathy Smith noted that calls are being made to homebound and other members of the congregation. She recommended everyone make calls, as it is much appreciated.

Quarterly Mission suggestions were brought to Council, and approved.

- 4<sup>th</sup> Quarter 2020 Family Pathways Food Shelf and Black Dog Hill Shelter for battered women and children. Both charities are under the Family Pathways umbrella.
- 1<sup>st</sup> Quarter 2021 -- Luther Point Bible Camp they need support to get programs running and prepare for summer camp. FLC is a member of Luther Point.

**Stewardship** – Ashley Sjodin noted the Stewardship Drive is going well. Intent cards will be mailed soon, and need to be returned by Nov. 1. A celebration of the success of the stewardship drive will take place Nov. 8. The Stewardship Committee plans to meet throughout the year.

**Worship & Music** – Mary Bye noted the committee did not meet. Views on livestreamed worship services on Facebook are increasing. Pastor is looking at prerecording some items for viewers to have a better experience.

Memorial Committee – Rae Ann Mosiman reported one memorial gift has been received to date.

Committee reports were approved by Council.

#### **Old Business**

MN Stay Safe Order – Livestream Worship and virtual Bible studies, Confirmation and Youth classes are going well.

<u>Planning for FLC Annual meeting</u> – ELCA Minneapolis Synod sent out instruction on how and if annual meetings can be held during COVID restrictions. Council can adopt a continuing resolution to the Constitution that would allow a virtual meeting in the case of a pandemic or emergency situation. A resolution will be drawn up for Council approval.

<u>Funerals</u> - Pastor is open to hosting them inside the church, but must be in compliance with state health guidelines during the COVID pandemic. It will be at our discretion and the service would be available virtually. An updated funeral procedure during COVID-19 will be presented to Council for approval.

Council to meet Oct. 23 to take care of these urgent business items.

**Council Positions** that will be open for 2021: Three 3-year terms: Monica Pavin, Ann Krueger, Sheryl Christensen; and one 1-year term, currently open: Justin Carroll

Signers on Capital Improvement Bank Account to be updated.

New Business: Pastor Ian announced he and Sarah are expecting a child in the spring, hopefully after Easter! Exciting news!

Meeting adjourned.

#### Special Council Meeting - October 23, 2020

Kathy Smith called the meeting to order.

A suggestion was made that plans should be in place for Baptisms and Weddings during the COVID pandemic. Pastor Ian noted a baptism is scheduled at the end of November. A baptism policy is currently in place, and had been approved by the Worship and Music Committee. Pastor will review to assure it complies with current health guidelines. No weddings are scheduled until possibly next summer.

#### **Funeral/Memorial Procedure**

Pastor presented a draft COVID-19 Funeral/Memorial Service Procedure, with guidelines for holding services within the church building. Following discussion, Council approved as written.

#### Continuing Resolution for Congregational Meetings to be Held Remotely

Kathy Smith presented a draft Continuing Resolution for Congregational Meetings to be Held Remotely in the event of emergency situations, such as pandemics or national emergencies. Absentee balloting may be authorized by the Church Council. After discussion, Council approved as written.

Ron Schleif and Tim Sjodin have agreed to be signers on the Capital Improvement Account held at Flagship Bank in Isanti, MN. Council approved.
